Reunion 2014

In the Sparrows Nest Gardens both the Martello Cafe and Giardino, the Italian restaurant and bar, will be open during the day - and in Giardino they serve rum! - so you know where to find me. It is an ideal place to sit and swing the lamp and imagine you are a young matelot on a run ashore.

Association / Museum future

With the passage of time we have, guite naturally, seen the number of RNPS veterans diminish and more importantly ones who were in a position to take an active part and so we have become reliant on help from Associate members and volunteers. We as a committee are very aware that to continue to run both the Association and the Museum that certain changes need to be made to enable the story of the RNPS to be perpetuated and that any changes have to be made in the correct manner in order to maintain our charitable status.

At the last AGM we made a commitment to the membership that we would look carefully at the situation and report back accordingly. To this end, committee member and Trustee, Mike Sims, drafted a set of words that could be used as a discussion document. From this the committee discussed it at some length making changes and suggestions and also taking advice where appropriate, ending with what we think is a workable document that not only reflects the current position but takes into account the future thereby securing everything that has been achieved over the years for future generations.

At this point it is your chance to read through our document and make your comments or signify your acceptance of it. Subject to any changes, the document will be officially presented at the 2014 AGM for ratification. If we do not hear from any member we will take this as their acceptance of the document.

The following is for your consideration.

Introduction

As you must be aware the declining numbers of RNPS Association members have meant that we have had to think seriously about the future of the Association. At the Annual General Meeting in 2013 it was agreed that we should examine ways of preserving the benevolent aspects of the Association whilst anyone was qualified to receive any benefit but also to try to find a way of enabling the preservation of RNPS achievements in the museum.

Under the current rules this means widening the criteria for membership to allow those who did not serve in RNPS to play an active role and to hold Office within the Association. Without this the Association will fail.

The Association is registered as a charity but currently the only charitable aspect of the Association is the alleviation of need by 'Served members' (see Rule 3) and their dependents, ie. the Benevolent fund. Before many years have passed there will be no call on the Benevolent fund.

To remain a charity the Association needs to widen its objects to include other legally defined charitable purposes. Running a museum and education are both such purposes.

It could well be that we cannot just add the Museum and remain a charity but will need to wind up the one charity in favour of the Served members, create a new one to cover running the Museum and somehow transfer the funds.

We need to take professional advice to ensure that we achieve this and that advice will mean a cost. We have already received free advice from a legally qualified Honorary member who has suggested forming a trading company for the Museum, a company limited by guarantee.

If we decide to follow that advice there will be a further not insubstantial cost and an obligation to make company returns annually and failure to make those returns will incur a financial penalty.

We believe that the starting point is to set out a framework constitution for approval by the membership. Once we have that we can then take it for a legal opinion of a solicitor who specialises in charities to ensure that it will meet the Charity Commission criteria. Only then would we approach the Charity Commission and if we decide to form a company then we will need to go back to the lawyers as well.

THE CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF THE ROYAL NAVAL PATROL SERVICE ASSOCIATION:

1. <u>The Objects</u> of the Association shall be to preserve the memory of the achievements of those men and women with the Royal Naval Patrol Service during the years 1939 to 1946 and to assist them and/or their widows and their direct dependents (see note 1) still living who are in conditions of need, hardship, sickness or distress.

2. The preservation of the memory of the achievements is accomplished by the RNPS Museum and the RNPS Memorial. The maintenance of the memorial is the responsibility of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission but that of the Museum is the RNPS Association.

Membership shall fall into three categories:

3. <u>Served members:</u> of RNPSA is available to men and women of all ranks, and all auxiliaries who served and worked in HMS Europa or any ship or establishment attached to HMS Europa, up to the cessation of the Royal Naval Patrol Service.

4. <u>Member</u>: of RNPSA is available to all those who do not fall into 3. (above) but who wish to support the objects of the Association.

5. <u>Honorary Member</u>: of RNPSA may be granted by the Executive of the Association as a mark of recognition to anyone who has given substantial voluntary service or assistance to the Association (see note 2). An Honorary member has no power within the Association but they may join as a Served member (if they qualify) or as a Member if they wish to play an active role.

Administration

6a. The administration of the Association shall be in the hands of the National Committee, elected annually from the Served members and Members. The Committee shall comprise the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer (who together shall comprise the Executive) and a minimum of three others who will be directly elected by the voting members.

6b. A Vice-Chairman may be elected by the Committee members from the remaining members of the Committee and will be a member of the Executive. The Committee will set the rates for subscriptions and oversee the administration of the Association.

6c. The Executive shall have the power to co-opt any Served member or Member to fill a vacancy on the Committee, or any person for their specialist knowledge or expertise.

6d. All members of the Committee will retire at the Annual General Meeting but will be eligible to stand for office again.

Subscriptions & Finance

7. The annual subscription for each grade of membership shall be such sum as the Committee shall determine from time to time, payable on the 1st day of January in each year.

8. 20% of all subscriptions received, together with all interest from any Investment Account, shall be paid into the Benevolent Fund in January in each year.

9. The Treasurer will maintain records of both the General and the Benevolent funds and report them quarterly to the Executive and annually to the whole membership. Signatories to Association bank accounts will be the Executive, any two members to sign.

10. The General fund will be used for the day to day running expenses of the Association. The Benevolent fund will meet the expenses that arise when assisting Served members and their widows/widowers in need and the expenses of preserving the memory of the achievements of RNPS, as indicated in the Objects.

<u>Rules</u>

11a. No rule of the Association shall be repealed or amended, and no new rule shall be made, save by a majority of the members present at a General Meeting.

11b. Every proposed alteration to the rules shall be notified to the Secretary at least one month before Spring Newsletter or one month before Autumn Newsletter. This will enable the Secretary to inform every voting member via the Newsletter, by email or by post to their last known address so that they may attend the AGM to vote or submit a proxy vote.

11c. No alteration, amendment or addition shall be made to these Rules, the effect of which would cause the Association to cease to be a charity in law.

Notes:

1. Direct dependents shall be limited to the sons and daughters of anyone who would have qualified as a 'Served member' whether they are/were an Association member or not.

2. 'Life membership', 'Honorary membership' and/or 'Honorary Life membership' of the Association has been extended to many people in the past, some for the current criteria, others as widows/widowers of veterans and some for no direct support of the Association other than that the office they held at the time. These grades are not withdrawn but will no longer be awarded.

The Lord Kitchener Memorial Holiday Centre



The Lord Kitchener Memorial Holiday Centre is a registered Lowestoft charity whose aim is to provide holiday accommodation to ex-servicemen and their wives/partners as well as the widows and widowers of ex-service personnel.

Some ex Patrol Service members are already aware of the Centre which offers half board (bed, breakfast and evening meal) from April to the end of October at rates well below the average, because of grants given by some major military benevolent funds. The quality of both the food and service are of an extremely high standard and there are ten en-suite twin bedded rooms.

Many more members, and probably most Associate members and friends of the Patrol Service, are not aware of the Centre. The criteria for being able to stay at the Centre is that you and/or your spouse should at some period have served in the British or

Commonwealth armed forces or the merchant navy. This has recently been extended to include widows and widowers as well.

Now that the number of Patrol Service veterans is declining the Centre may be of interest to subsequent generations particularly those who are researching their family history. If you or your spouse are eligible to stay at the Centre having served in any armed or merchant service (as described above) then why not consider visiting while you investigate your local connections. You don't actually have to be on holiday or even be a member of the RNPS Association!

Lowestoft had a very large service population during WW2, with five separate Royal Navy bases in the town as well as an infantry garrison, coastal defence artillery, anti-aircraft defences of guns and searchlights and many local airfields. The Centre itself spent most of WW2 as a social club for the WRNS under the watchful eye of a resident member of the Church Army. You don't even have to be researching service history. If your interest is the fishing industry, shipbuilding (Richards, Brooke Marine, Leo Robinson, etc.), transport (Eastern Coachworks, The East Anglia Transport Museum, etc.) or anything else you can just use the Centre as a residential base provided you are eligible to stay.


Local resources for research include the Royal Naval Patrol Service Museum at Sparrow's Nest Gardens where there is also the War Memorial Museum and the Maritime Museum, and the Lowestoft Museum in Nicholas Everitt Park. The Suffolk Record Office has a wealth of historical information and they have a branch at Lowestoft Library which is open every day of the week including Sundays.

If you don't have a week to spare to visit then why not consider spending a few days here? Kitchener's is now able to offer short breaks of three days (Saturday to Monday nights inclusive) and four days (Tuesday to Friday nights inclusive) as well as the usual week long holidays.

British Cemeteries, North Carolina



There are 2 small British cemeteries on what are known as the Outer Banks in North Carolina, the first at Buxton has only 2 graves, both British seamen, one from the tanker San Delphino and the other from HMT Bedfordshire and the other cemetery at Ocracoke has 4 graves, again British seamen all from HMT Bedfordshire which was sunk by U boat on May 12th 1942, there were no survivors and only these bodies were recovered. Every year a service is held at both cemeteries attended by the US Coast Guard and the British and Canadian Naval Attaches. For many years our Canadian Secretary, Patrick Griffiths, represented our Association but the torch has now been taken up by Associate Member Richard Eagles who lives in Florida and makes the 2,000 mile round trip to represent us.

The following article comes from the local "Island Free Press" and the poem was written by Johnnie Baum who has written and read a poem every year but unfortunately this year was too ill to attend but it was read out on his behalf.

Charles Hassell and Ted Rex learned about a piece of North Carolina history of which they were unaware when they attended the annual British Cemetery Memorial remembrance Friday on Ocracoke.

Elementary school teachers in Raleigh, the two were attending a conference at North Carolina Center for the Advancement of Teaching. They talked with Commander David Trudeau, with the Royal Canadian Navy, who was among several military officials in attendance, who explained Canada's reverence for the Battle of the Atlantic every first Sunday in May.

"We're expanding our knowledge," Rex said about the German U-boat brigade that for six months picked off allied convoys like a shooting gallery off the Outer Banks in 1942.

"I'd never heard about this. (Attending this event) is like walking down a hall and opening a door," he said . "I'd heard there were German U-boats off the coast but didn't know how many," Hassell added. "It's not well known because the government didn't want the American people to know about it and start a panic," noted islander Peter Vankevich, who had joined the group's conversation.

Staging for the North Atlantic convoys took place in Canada. Since 1974, Ocracoke has remembered the four British sailors whose bodies washed ashore after a U-boat on May 11, 1942, torpedoed the HMT Bedfordshire, a British trawler pressed into military service to ferry supplies.

Two of the sailors were identified: Sub-Lieutenant Thomas Cunningham and Ordinary Telegraphist Second Class Stanley Craig.

The people of Ocracoke rallied and donated the land on which the four are interred and which is now owned by Great Britain. Two other British sailors are interred in a second cemetery in Buxton and were remembered the day before the Ocracoke event. These are the only World War II British cemeteries in the United States.

Under the auspices of the Graveyard of the Atlantic Museum, the U.S. Coast Guard, the National Park Service, and the Ocracoke Civic and Business Association conduct remembrances of these men who made the ultimate sacrifice. Also participating were the U.S. Coast Guard Pipe Band, the U.S. Coast Guard Honor Guard, which conducted the 21-gun salute, Ocracoke Boy Scout Troup #290 and islander Howard Bennink, who played taps.

"The freedom we enjoy today is not free, but comes with a price," said Col. Alan Litster, a British Royal Marine attaché, to the more than 150 attendees on Friday. "We were allies during World War II fighting evil and tyranny," Trudeau said in his remarks, "and we are still allies, friends and neighbors. "Karen and Tom Turner of Atlanta were on Ocracoke for a family reunion and attended the ceremony. "It was very moving," Karen said, "especially when they read the names of Bedfordshire sailors who died. "Each year, Ocracoke High School students read the story of the Bedforsdshire and the roll of those who died. Wyatt Norris read the story and Alma Flores read the roll call.

Richard Eagles, formerly of London and now of Margate, Fla., attended the event in honor of his 91-year-old uncle Jeffrey Palmer, who had been a member of the British Royal Patrol Service, which was the name of this section of the British military in the Battle of the Atlantic. He and Andrew Wolf of Miami, Fla., made the trip to the Outer Banks as representatives of the alumni of the Patrol Service. "It's important to them that someone be here," Eagles said.



It's never too late

We are constantly getting enquiries from people trying to find old shipmates and all too often it is a fruitless search given the passage of time since the end of the war. But here is a story with a happy ending. Jeff Palmer had been a stoker on BYMS 2047 but had no contact with any of his old shipmates but in a roundabout way a relative of his came across a piece on a web site where Charlie Cook was looking for some info on his uncle Don Holland, who served as signalman on the 2047. Jeff had a number of photos of signalman Holland and tried to contact the email address, with no immediate luck, after some months had passed Jeff's nephew found another email address looking for the same info and he contacted Charlie who was writing a small booklet on his uncle. The two were put in contact and some photos were supplied to Charlie and included in a portfolio now at the Sparrows Nest.

Six months later in response to Jeff's post Julian Groves saw on Harry Tate's Navy web site a post from Stoker Palmer and contacted Jeff's nephew saying that his neighbour Sid Fenwick was the Wireless Operator on the ship and asked if the photos Julian had posted on Sid's behalf were the same as Jeff's (they were). However 68 years had passed and Sid could not remember the names of any of his ship mates. Jeff could remember quite a few in photo and said Sid could reach out and touch Jeff on the shoulder in the photo. Sid gave Julian some more photos to scan and send via email. Low and behold by shear luck the very first photo to come through was of Jeff and Sid with their arms across each other's shoulder. Uncanny! Jeff and Sid have been reunited and two years later they still keep in touch. Both men are now 90. Sid is six weeks older than Jeff and they were the two youngest men on the 2047 and fairly certain these are the last two surviving men. Don Holland passed away in the mid 90's. Jeff's nephew and Charlie Cook who both live in the USA still keep in touch. Sid and Jeff have some really interesting stories of their time on the 2047 and would be willing to share them if anyone is interested and can be contacted through the newsletter (however time is not a friend). Grenade sweeping, the Crash into the Pier in Halifax, laying smoke in the channel, the worrying Atlantic crossing, escorting the Dutch Tug Antilles to rescue the USS Barr, the hoisting of sails on the diesel engine ship and pilfering oranges and rum are some of their stories.
